Wages Paid to the Irish Orphans, 1849-51

This August, we travel to Bathurst, Yass, Goulburn and the Central Coast to

share stories about some of the 4,100 young Irish women who came to Australia between 1848 and 1850 as part of Earl Grey's Famine Orphan Scheme.

Recruited from workhouses in Ireland, the women became an integral part of the workforce in their adopted country. The register of wages paid to orphans from 1849 to 1851 is a key source in researching the stories of many Irish girls and women who arrived in NSW under the scheme. It contains details of the orphans, their employers and the wages paid.

Join our archivists for an illustrated presentation about these Irish women and take advantage of this rare opportunity to view the original register from the State Archives Collection.



Federation of Australia

In late July 1839, Henry Parkes, often described as the 'Father of Federation', arrived in Sydney with his wife Clarinda, having departed from Gravesend, England. This began his association with the colony of New South Wales, which would lead to five Premierships and his emergence as a key figure in the Federation movement.

The process to federate the six Australian colonies into the Commonwealth of Australia took more than 50 years from its beginnings in the 1840s.




Making a House a Home with Vita Cochran




Railway personal history cards - employees born before 1900

The cards in this fully digitised series (NRS-12922) detail the service history of railway employees born prior to 1900, and were kept by the Finance Branch to record rates of pay, leave, and superannuation entitlements. Most cards relate to permanent employees, but some cards for construction and casual employees are also included.

The cards do not provide details of people whose employment had ceased prior to the introduction of the Railway Service Superannuation Act, effective from 1 October 1910.

Employees' history cards, NSW public service

This fully digitised series (**NRS-12295**) contains employee history cards from 1911 to 1968 and covers workers from all parts of the NSW public service during this time.

The cards were produced by the Public Service Board and recorded staff from the departments of the Chief Secretary, Treasury, Attorney-General, Lands, Public Works, Justice, Public Instruction, Mines and Agriculture, and the Office of the Public Service Board.

The information includes the employee's name, department, date of birth, employment date, department, whether they were permanent or temporary, their salary, allowance and basic wage, and remarks.
