## What's on at the Museum of Sydney



### **Seeing Sydney, Knowing Country**

Open daily, 10am-5pm, free entry

Sydney is known for its iconic harbour, scenic foreshores, bushland reserves, and ever-growing urban and suburban areas. But how were its

landscapes experienced and understood in the past?

Seeing Sydney, Knowing Country explores the development of the NSW colony through a selection of significant historical maps, plans, sketches, artworks and objects from the Museums of History NSW and other institutional collections, alongside picturesque colonial landscape prints from the collection of Beat Knoblauch.

Inscribed over this colonial perspective is an innovative artistic intervention, led by Dharawal and Yuin artist and designer Alison Page, with input from the Sydney Coastal Aboriginal Women's Group, that layers First Nations understandings of Country. Traditional owners' knowledge of Country, developed over 60,000 years, offers a way to gain a deep appreciation of the landscapes we encounter in Sydney today.

### Let's party like it's 1815 by Joan Ross

Open daily, 10am-5pm, free entry

Let's party like it's 1815 by Joan Ross is an eight-minute digital artwork on display at the Museum of Sydney that colourfully critiques the legacy of the colonisation of Australia.

Ross assembles what she calls 'a tableau of greed', in which colonists

display their disregard for nature and self-assumed superiority by partying on land that they have claimed. She presents an insatiable culture of overconsumption, depicting Australian colonisation as 'a car crash'.

### Hope by Hiromi Tango

Hope is a dynamic digital projection artwork that uses the facade of the UNESCO World Heritage–listed Hyde Park Barracks as its canvas, absorbing the stories within and connecting them with visitors today. The work responds to the history of the Barracks as a place that provided refuge to people who, for various reasons, found themselves in vulnerable situations.

Accompanying the digital projection are five large-scale 'hope flowers' that welcome visitors through the gates, and *Hope garden*, a textile-based installation that will grow throughout the artwork display period.



### **Queering Macquarie Street**

Hyde Park Barracks, Saturday 14 June, various times

For Pride Month (1–30 June), Museums of History NSW curator Dr Tuan Nguyen will lead a history walk down Macquarie Street, exploring stories of queer people who walked along the same path: from same-sex relationships between convicts at the Hyde Park Barracks, to the first female Mitchell Librarian, Ida Leeson (who was in a committed lesbian relationship with Florence Birch for over 50 years), and bushranger Andrew George Scott (aka Captain Moonlite), whose late-19th-century criminal

career involved The Mint and the Water Police Court – and many more.

Starting at the Hyde Park Barracks and finishing at the Justice & Police Museum, this 90-minute walking tour will examine what and how we know about these queer lives, often lived in secret and under the threat of persecution.




## Meroogal Women's Art Prize 2024

### **Community Policing, Policing a Community**

Tuesday 24 June 6pm-7.30pm

Policing has two sides: the police and the policed. On the anniversary of the first Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras (24 June 1978), join us for this special *Collections Series* event. This panel discussion between Garry Wotherspoon (78er and historian), George Savoulis (Curatorial Director, Qtopia Sydney) and Tuan Nguyen (Assistant Curator, Museums of History NSW) will consider the complex relationship between the LGBTQIA+ community and the police, within the walls of the former Water Police Court at the Justice & Police Museum.

The discussion will use the Darlinghurst Police Station – now the home of Otonia Sydney, a centre for queer history and culture – as a point of


reference, drawing upon photographs and plans from Museums of History NSW collections.

### **Volunteer Symposium**


The Mint, Monday 28 and Tuesday 29 July

Online, Friday 30 May, 10.30am-11.30am


