From missing wages to disputes between neighbours, the Courts of Petty Sessions (now known as the Local Court) were long a place where communities sought justice. From 1846, the courts settled claims for debts of up to £10, and their Small Debts Registers document countless cases.

As part of our *Archives for Everyone* project, we've partnered with NSW community groups to digitise and index these valuable records.

Now, the registers are on tour! Join us for a unique opportunity to view these original documents and gain insights from our archivists. Featuring material from Museums of History NSW's State Archives, Caroline Simpson Library and museum collections, this talk will uncover fascinating histories of local communities in NSW and the people who shaped them.



New index – Registers of Appointments



Grief in the archives: a Blak reflection on

[Civil Service Board], 1885–96

We're pleased to announce the release of the **Registers of Appointments [Civil Service Board] Index** containing over 15,000 entries, fully digitised and discoverable online through our website. The index has been created by our amazing volunteers.

The registers were created by the Civil Service Board from 1885 to 1896, when the Board's responsibilities included conducting qualifying examinations for the appointment and promotion of civil servants, presenting to the minister a list of qualified people for each vacant position, and serving as the central controlling authority of a large number of NSW Government departments.

Information recorded in the registers can include the date from which the appointment is effective, name, age, position, department, office, date of first appointment, details of transfers, salary, and date of notification of appointment and how notified, whether by Gazette notice (entered in black) or by departmental notification (entered in red).

The index is searchable by employee's first name, surname, department and date appointed.

Sorry Day

In this article, Dylan Hoskins, Project Assistant on the First Nations Community Access to Archives project, reflects on the significance of National Sorry Day through his lived experience as an Aboriginal person.

The article critically examines the systemic removal of Aboriginal children through legislation such as the Aborigines Protection Act 1909 (NSW) and its 1943 amendment and engages with the findings of the National Inquiry into the Separation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children from Their Families, outlined in the Bringing them home report, published in 1997. Drawing on the NSW State Archives Collection and his personal narrative, Dylan explores how colonial bureaucracy inflicted intergenerational trauma, and calls for genuine, reparative change beyond symbolic gestures.

An immersive solution to preserving the past

An important part of Collections Care work at the Western Sydney Records Centre is to conserve records that have been requested by readers and assessed as 'requiring repair'.

Conservator Abigail Hundley has been preparing a box of signalmen's records (RNCG-6772-1-[A4382]) recently requested by a reader. An almanac and post office directory – a supplement to *The Sydney Morning Herald* from 1 January 1858 – in very poor condition was found within this box of records. The item had suffered extensive insect damage in the past. It could not be handled as the paper resembled lace from the damage and was incredibly brittle.

Find out how our conservation team stabilised and strengthened this record so that it can be handled for future access by the public.



A collection about Australian plants, gardens and gardening

Planning for the upcoming display *Scientific Splendour: The art of botanical illustration*, staff at the Caroline Simpson Library have been taking a deep dive into the **Richard Clough Collection**.

Mental Health Patient Records

Online, Friday 27 June, 10.30am– 11.30am

In 1811, Governor Macquarie ordered that several Parramatta Gaol inmates who were 'labouring under the affliction of mental derangement' be transferred to the former convict barracks at Castle Hill, establishing the first government asylum in NSW. By the end of the century, a total of 4,198 inmates were housed in government-run and -licensed institutions across NSW.

This webinar will explore the surviving patient records created by government mental health facilities that are held within the State Archives Collection, such as registers, admission papers, medical case books and case papers.

Department of Lands correspondence registers (various)



Seeing Sydney, Knowing Country

Museum of Sydney, open daily, 10am-5pm, free entry

Today, Sydney is known for its iconic harbour, scenic foreshores, bushland reserves, and ever-growing urban and suburban areas. But how were its landscapes experienced and understood in the past?

This exhibition depicts the development of the NSW colony through a selection of historical maps, plans, sketches, artworks and objects. Inscribed over this colonial perspective is an innovative artistic intervention, led by Dharawal and Yuin artist and designer Alison Page, with input from the Sydney Coastal Aboriginal Women's Group, that layers First Nations understandings of Country. Traditional owners' knowledge of Country, developed over 60,000 years, offers a way to gain a deep appreciation of the landscapes we encounter in Sydney today.

In conversation: Community Policing, Policing a Community
