Check out these Web Tips

The [Dependent Children Registers](#) held at the Museums of History NSW contain records relating to children who were admitted to State care between 1883 and 1923. They record where the dependent children were placed (whether with foster parents or guardians), with some children being eventually adopted.

[Find and Connect](#) was developed by a team of historians, archivists and social workers from the University of Melbourne and Australian Catholic University, with funding from the Australian Government. It provides counselling and assistance to people who spent time in care as children between 1920 and 1980, helping individuals find information about the institutions they lived in, the reasons behind the welfare policies of the time and where records created about the children exist and how to access them.

[The Public Record Office, Victoria](#) can assist in finding historic records (over 99 years) that may contain details of children who were adopted or made wards of the state in Victoria - individuals who experienced institutional or out-of-home 'care' as children whilst under the guardianship of a State child welfare authority. Note that not all children who were adopted were made wards of the state, nor were all wards of the state later adopted.

[Adopted.com](#) is a search tool designed to connect adoptees with their biological families, while also building a supportive community for those searching. This is a subscription site with the ability to register three search profiles for free with a simple form used to drive the search process. The ability to upgrade to a paid account to take advantage of additional features on the site is available at any time and the DNA search component is growing with the assistance of partners 23andMe; Ancestry, My Heritage and FamilyTreeDNA.
