

Little footsteps, big

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Winnafreda, Countess of Portarlington

Our current Caroline Simpson Library display features original plates from Robert Thornton's renowned publication *The temple of Flora*, published in batches between 1799 and 1807. The plates were originally part of the collection of Winnafreda, Countess of Portarlington.

Australian by birth, Winnie Portarlington, as she was known to her friends, was one of the most glamorous and well-connected women in British society in the first half of the 20th century.

New index: Sentenced to Parramatta Female Factory

During Family History Month, we are delighted to announce the addition of a new index on our website – a list of all the women sentenced by the Sydney courts to serve time at the Parramatta Female Factory.

Entries list each woman's name, ship of arrival, offence and sentence. Other names, such as a married name or an alias, are also recorded. Additional details, including references to documents such as Certificates of Freedom or census entries, are provided in the Remarks section.

This index has been created by Margaret Jones and David Jones, who also generously donate their time as MHNSW collections volunteers. They created this index as a personal project and made it available to all of us. Margaret and David, we cannot thank you enough for everything that you do!

Ships, More Ships, and Still More Ships

The NSW State Dockyard, Newcastle, opened in 1942 at the height of World War II. Brought under state jurisdiction in 1943, it played a large role in the war effort by meeting the increasing demand for 'ships, more ships, and still more ships'.

By the end of the war, 21 new vessels had been built at the dockyard and more than 600 vessels, many of which had been heavily damaged by enemy action, had docked there to be repaired. The dockyard remained a significant manufacturing asset for NSW until its closure in 1987.

Local council records

The records created by local councils are a great source of historical information about the people, places and progress of towns in your area.

Although many of these records are still held in council archives, many more from councils all over NSW are now part of the State Archives Collection. Minutes of council meetings, rate books and correspondence records are among the most common items in the collection, but there are a number of series relating to town building and development, the provision of

The series NRS-549 Photograph albums of Mr L. G. Watt consists of two leather-bound photograph albums collated between 1928 and 1935 by Lionel George Morris Watt, Administrating Officer to the Board of Fire Commissioners of New South Wales.

The photographs within provide a visual account of the commissioners' trips around NSW, as well as parts of Victoria, Queensland and South Australia. They document the route the

utilities, council supplies and financial management.


Friday 12 September, 10am-12pm, free, registration essential

Seeing Sydney, Knowing Country

Museum of Sydney, open daily, 10am-5pm, free entry


Today, Sydney is known for its iconic harbour, scenic foreshores, bushland reserves, and ever-growing urban and suburban areas. But how were its landscapes experienced and understood in the past?

This exhibition depicts the development of the NSW colony through a selection of historical maps, plans, sketches, artworks and objects. Inscribed over this colonial perspective is an innovative artistic intervention, led by Dharawal and Yuin artist and designer Alison Page, with input from

the Sydney Coastal Aboriginal Women's Group, that layers First Nations understandings of Country. Traditional owners' knowledge of Country, developed over 60,000 years, offers a way to gain a deep appreciation of the landscapes we encounter in Sydney today.

Webinar: Theatres and Public Hall Files

Theatres and public halls are an integral part of local communities. Owned and run by private individuals, businesses, religious organisations, community groups and councils, these places have long provided dedicated spaces for community members to meet for a variety of purposes, from dances and social gatherings to movies and live entertainment.


The State Archives Collection's series of theatre and public hall files (NRS-15318) documents the licensing of these premises, including plans and specifications, building inspections, and correspondence. These files tell the stories not only of local businesses, but also of the recreational lives of the town.
